Melaleuca (Melaleuca quinquenervia)

Instant ID


- Evergreen tree up to 100 feet tall
- Papery bark that flakes easily
- Narrow leaves four inches long and 3/4 inch wide
- · Creamy white "bottle brush" flowers
- Small fruits are clustered around the stem and match the color of the stem

Hijacked Habitats

- Native to Australia
- Introduced to Florida as an ornamental in 1906
- Grows in wet and dry environments
- Found in central and south Florida
- Rapidly colonizing portions of the Everglades







Melaleuca (Melaleuca quinquenervia)

Plant Particulars

- A single fruit can contain 200 to 300 seeds
- Also known as the punktree or cajeput tree
- Flowers and fruits year-round
- Crushed leaves smell like camphor oil

Population Prevention

- Fast and dense growth leads to the displacement (replacement) of native plants
- Florida Noxious Weed List Rule 5B-57.007 states it is "unlawful to introduce, multiply, possess, move, or release" this species
