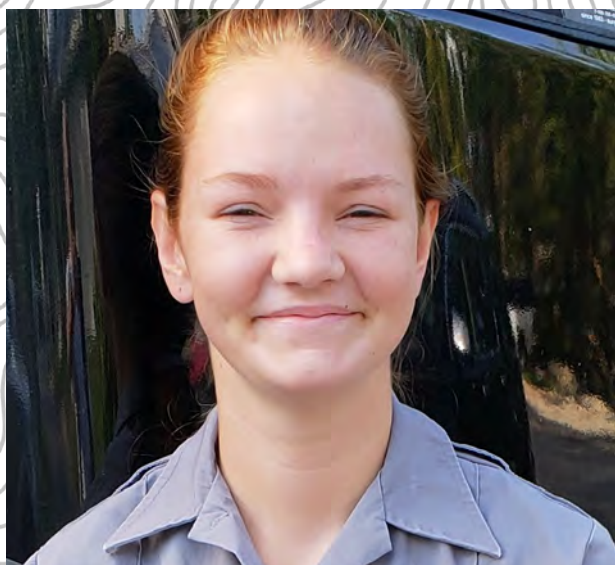


Adult Volunteer of the Year for Administration

Natural Bridge Battlefield Historic State Park

Since 2008, volunteers have assisted scientists with the collection of sea turtle data for the Statewide Nesting Beach Survey Program. The park's friends group buys supplies and recruits, trains and manages volunteers. Experienced volunteer leaders uphold scientific integrity and permit requirements and manage 50 additional volunteers who protect and collect data from sea turtle nests.

THE BARNACLE SOCIETY, INC.

The Barnacle Historical State Park

This project included funding, designing and installing a fire suppression system in the 1891 Barnacle house and boathouse, protecting and preserving the oldest house in Miami-Dade County. The house's interior is wood framed and contains all original furnishings. The 1926 boathouse was central to family activities in an era when boats served as the central mode of transportation.



Long-Term Project of the Year for Resource-Based Recreation

BUTTERFLY PROGRAMS

John D. MacArthur Beach State Park

Since 2004, Cathy Beals has worked in the nursery and garden at MacArthur Beach and often facilitates butterfly walks along with a slideshow presentation for visitors. She improves and maintains the appearance of the park's garden and nursery preserve, and educates visitors about native plants, pollinators and butterflies.

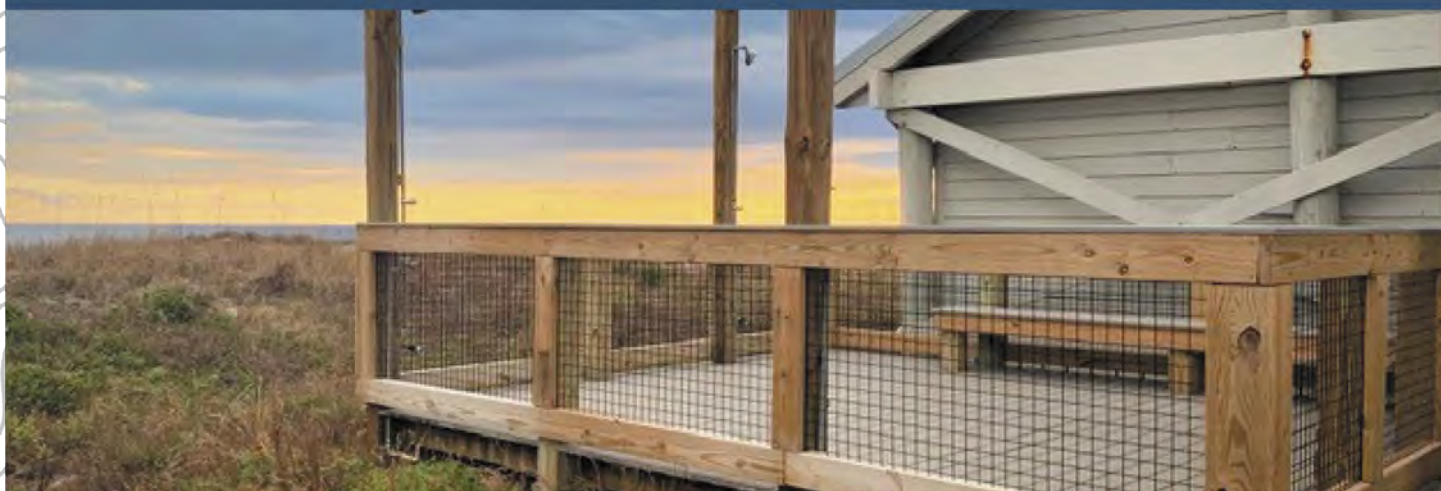
Short-Term Project of the Year for Resource-Based Recreation
